

The University of Kentucky Center for Excellence in Rural Health-Hazard and the Hazard Community & Technical College share a joint responsibility for increased access to higher education for all Kentuckians.



This five-year joint project between Hazard Community and Technical College (HCTC) and the University of Kentucky Center for Excellence in Rural Health will develop a research pipeline for community college students in southeastern Kentucky--a distinct, persistently impoverished region within Appalachia with historically limited exposure to research and academic opportunities. This means that many promising local students have been denied exposure to the research professions, which limits the ability of the local populace to participate in community-based solutions to what are often contextual and culture-bound problems. This exciting program for HCTC students provides meaningful service learning and interdisciplinary research opportunities that address relevant and significant health disparities within the Appalachian population.

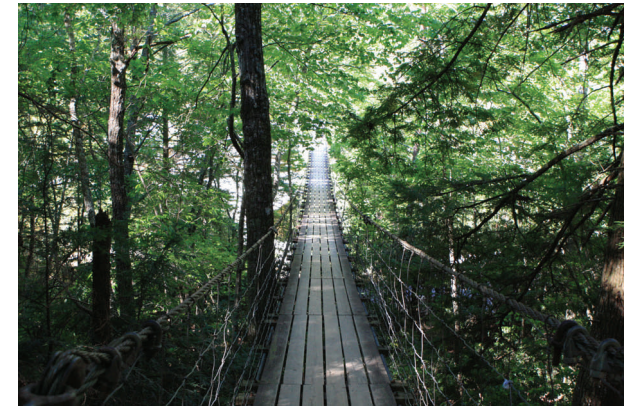

Bridges Scholars Program

The University of Kentucky Center for Excellence in Rural Health–Hazard (UKCERH) and Hazard Community & Technical College (HCTC) have partnered on a project that is intended to increase the number of local students who pursue a bachelor's degree in the biomedical or behavioral sciences. Program components will include career counseling, student research experiences and academic enrichment strategies.



Bridges Scholars will participate in an exciting new program funded by the National Institute of Health and delivered here in Hazard. This program is designed to support talented local students interested in the biomedical and behavioral sciences as they transition from community college to their baccalaureate program. Our hope is to cultivate students with an interest in improving their community, so that when they complete their education they will bring back their skills and knowledge to their respective communities.

Eligibility and Application Process

Mission

To increase the number of students from Appalachia who are represented within the scientific disciplines and who will subsequently utilize that expertise in addressing health disparities within the Appalachian population.

Eligibility

Full-time Hazard Community and Technical College students who express an interest in research and intend to transfer for a bachelor's degree within the biomedical and behavioral sciences.

Important Information

We hope to provide each Bridges Scholar with the supportive services and academic skills that will allow each student to be successful in his or her chosen specialty. To achieve this goal, we will provide the following:

- Mentoring by local professionals (e.g. physicians, researchers, psychologists, physical therapists, and pharmacists,) to provide exposure and guidance in career decision making.
- Full financial support for you to attend scientific conferences to broaden your introduction into your field of interest. This type of networking will allow you to develop critical contacts within your selected professional community.
- Classes and workshops to provide you with the knowledge and skills to share with like-minded professionals.

Of course the application of this knowledge is also critical, so a central focus for our program is to introduce you to research activities. These research activities will be funded through a university student stipend, so that each participant has the opportunity to develop skills critical to the biomedical and behavioral professions while earning money to supplement his or her income.
